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

RUDY'S ROOST

Tips and Tricks

Part 3: Do you have enough Real Estate?

Have you ever wished that you had "a little more room" on your bell table? What with bells, mallets, sometimes handchimes and music risers, there is a lot of demand on the limited real estate available on top of a bell table.

When my choir, The Incredi-bells, was a 2-octave, then a 3-octave, then a 4-octave bell choir, the standard 30" wide tables found in most churches and schools provided adequate space for our bells and music. But when we added the 5th octave of bells AND then 6 octaves of handchimes, WHAMO! There wasn't enough space on the bass bell tables. But we have found, actually we built the perfect solution to our real estate problem. We created more real estate. We built and use the Rudy Bass Bell Tables. These tables are 36 inches WIDE and 36 inches long. See the picture below. Four of them set up side-by-side by side-by-side make for a spacious accommodation for our bass buddies.

Now we have room for bass bells and bass chimes! It is wonderful! Though, I must admit that we still use an extra 30 inch wide bass table to park some of the big 2x4 bass chimes.

Before you start surfing the Internet and scouring the department stores looking for these wonderful 36 inch wide bass tables, let me tell you: You probably will not find them. So where do you get your Rudy Bass Bell Tables? You make them. Here's how to make 4 tables which is what we use for our bass bells C3 through F4:

Step #1: Take 2 sheets of 3/4 inch thick structural plywood and cut 2 tabletops out of each sheet. Each tabletop should measure 36 inches by 36 inches.

Step #2: Go to a good office supply store and buy 4 five-foot long folding tables. You all are familiar with the 6-foot and 8-foot long variety of folding tables found in churches and school. Well, you can also buy 5-foot, long tables at quite a reduced price from the 6-foot tables. I bought our 5-foot tables for about \$30.00 each about 3 years ago.

Step #3: Once you have purchased your folding tables, turn them over and carefully unscrew the folding legs from the tables (save the screws) and install them on your plywood tabletops that you have cut.

Step #4: Paint the tabletops black or psychedelic colors if you prefer. Buy new foam pads and tablecloths, and voila! Acres of real estate for your bass bells to roam in.



The Rudy Bass Bell Table 36 inches by 36 inches

Tip #1: The structural grade of plywood that you want to use is: AC or CD plugged. You do not want any voids in the plies of the plywood. Do not use particleboard.

Tip #2: Drill and cut a small handhold slot in the middle of each table. Size: 1 inch wide by 5 inches long. Refer to the picture. This will help immensely to carry these big, bad boys and to set them up. Be sure to round the corners and edges of the handhold.

Tip #3: When buying the folding tables, look carefully at the attachment of the legs to the table. Be sure that it is attachable to your plywood tabletop. Also check the legs for sturdy, durable construction, because you will be placing some very expensive bells on these legs.

Tip #4: To find new pads for your new, wider tables, go to the industrial section of your town and check out the furniture makers and upholsters. They should be able to sell you 36 inch wide foam. Be sure to buy one of the softer foams for good table damping characteristics.

I remember the first time I set up our new 36 inch wide by 12 foot long combined bass bell tables; and stretched the black tablecloth on it; and then stepped back to look at my handiwork. My first thought was, "Wow! This is as big as an aircraft carrier. You could land jets on this thing!" Well, maybe, small jets. Needless to say, it has greatly improved in our bass bell ringing environment.

If you are ready to go to "the next level," build your own Rudy Bass Bell Tables. Try it. Mikey likes it! - Rudy Rodriquez

IMHO: DO WE TAKE HANDBELL PLAYING TOO SERIOUSLY?

Part 2

Some ringers raise their commitment level by traveling to conferences, taking classes or traveling on handbell tours. Other more advanced ringers step outside of their local ensemble to perform in community groups in more challenging music making. Most of these people couldn't care less whether the music is Level 2,3, or 4, whether they make any money, or whether they advance the handbell art. It's still a fun time to get together. For more advanced ringers the increasing difficulty means they get to play more, perhaps show off their skills and personally challenge themselves.

As standards for handbell playing have been raised a corresponding level of criticism has risen. There are several new platforms for these criticisms, including the Internet. Judging or critiquing a performance is a natural instinct. Doing it properly with good taste and in the right forum is a skill. One who is involved as an adjudicator for young or inexperienced performers knows that positive criticism is a must. It is encouraging and can be inspirational. Negative comments can destroy a young talent. How many have been told they can't sing or carry a pitch and given it up for a life-time?

Unfortunately, those who attend a handbell performance, choral, organ, etc., can make some rather harsh comments that are completely out of place. In these cases the critic should be criticized! I've read public harsh criticism of a group of young people, who played magnificently, berating them because they didn't play with enough musicality, their program was too light, or there wasn't enough variety. Do we expect adult maturity from youth who have been playing but a few years? Do we expect technical perfection from a group of older folks or children who rehearse once a week and perform when they are ready?

Directors can be part of the problem as well. A director with unrealistic expectations for his/her group's abilities, commitment, dedication, and purpose may push the group to such a point that

they rebel or drop out. Everyone is unhappy with repertoire which may be too hard or doesn't fit their purpose. Rehearsals may allow no "breathing" room; there may be too much music or too many difficult songs on concert programs; the repertoire expands too fast; performances are scheduled too often; directors get crabby and negative; rehearsals are extended and too many extra rehearsals are required. These are all signs that the director may be pushing too hard. Until all have the same goals and expectations, there will be many with hurt feelings.

So, should there be no criticism? No attempt to advance the art? Absolutely not! Handbell ensembles need to recognize who they are and how they fit into the handbell world. For example, in a school beginning handbell ensemble the students are learning the techniques of handbell ringing and reading music at ever increasing levels of difficulty. Their advancing goal will be to play in the next level group the following year. Students should be critiqued on that basis. The kids should have a good time making music as well. If a group states a purpose at a higher level, they are open to evaluation at that level. Indeed, most comments would best be said directly to the musical leader rather than in an open forum where feelings can get hurt.

Those groups who are said to be advancing the art, playing new music, performing in larger venues, charging higher prices, making recordings, etc., can be evaluated on the basis of their own goals. They are subject to much higher standards, and are the most likely to understand and accept worthwhile comments from respected people. They will make mistakes as they try new things, but as they expand the handbell envelope they will also open up new possibilities for the entire handbell world.

Go out and have fun! Play the handbells as well as you can; make music together while doing your best; work hard; support your group, and enjoy yourself! - Dave Ruder

A RINGERS' FEAST

On page 14 of this issue is an invitation to participate in **A RINGERS' FEAST** this coming June. Space is still available both in the dorm and at the tables at the time of this writing. [Accommodations in the dorm are available for both Friday, June 10 and Saturday, June 11.]

This event was born several years ago at one of the Area XII Board meetings, at which a great deal of discussion was held on how to meet the needs and desires of *ringers and directors who ring* who either wish a greater challenge than their home choirs might provide or simply wish to participate in yet another ringing event. The goal of those discussions was to create an event that ringers and directors could attend as individuals - irrespective of whether any others in their choirs were able to participate.

Jason Wells, director of *Ring of Fire*, has had amazing success with his ringers in learning their repertoire so thoroughly that using printed music in performance is unnecessary. The focus of this day-and-a-half event will be not only on handbell techniques but also on how he teaches the music to his ringers. His goal is to reach performance level mastery of five pieces of music with our Area XII ringers by mid-afternoon on Sunday - starting from the very beginning at 9:00 am on Saturday morning.

There are no preconceived minimum qualifications for registration! Any of your ringers - regardless of skill level - should benefit tremendously from this experience. The event will be held in the historic Edmunds Ballroom in the Smith Campus Center of Pomona College in Claremont. The dorm which has been designated for our use is Smiley Hall, which is located just across the lawn from the ballroom. Pomona College is the founding institution of the Claremont Colleges - now composed of Pomona College, Scripps College, Claremont McKenna College, Harvey Mudd College, Pitzer College, The Claremont Graduate University, and, most recently, the Keck Institute for Biotechnology.

As an added attraction, downtown Claremont has become a "destination" in itself in recent years, with nearly a dozen ethnic or domestic eateries within a two-block area. One of these - *The Village Grill* - sponsors a cruise night and car show throughout the downtown area periodically and which is scheduled for our Saturday evening.

We urge you to share news of this event with your ringers. Unlike most other Area XII happenings, this one is intended for ringers and directors as individuals rather than members of a larger group. 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

<u>Art</u> - skill, talent, knack, dexterity, ability, gift, expertise, flair.


Would any other combination of related words mean the same? I doubt it.
